2011 – 2012 Interval House Statistics

RESIDENTIAL PROGRAM

63 women and 65 children lived at Interval House

63% of the children were under age 6

16 different languages can be heard at the shelter

Abuse began during pregnancy for 13 women

384 hours of children's activities were logged inside our walls

Examples of children's activities included baking, planting flowers, board game nights and crafts.

28 family excursions took place outside of the centre

Some of the family excursions planned this year included trips to the movies, Ontario Science Centre, and skating at the Harbourfront Centre.

208 hours of women's group activities were logged at our home

Some of the groups are structured with topics such as health and wellness, legal rights and life skills.

Other groups are more activity-based and included nutrition workshops facilitated by a nutritionist, laughter yoga, expressive art and movie screenings.

55 women and children came to the Summer Picnic

70 women worked with the Career Developer

42 women graduated from the BESS program

BESS had a 67% hire rate

Women found jobs in industries like food services, administration, public relations, and education.

There we were, in our cramped-but-cozy old Victorian home. The basement leaked, and every inch of every corner was packed with stuff. Every couch had a pillow and blanket in case we needed to squeeze just one more desperate family into our home.

PAMELA'S STORY

BESS GRADUATE

“My experience here at Interval House was nothing short of life changing. I learned the skills necessary to cope with my personal issues and also how to prepare myself for the world out there mentally and physically – and how to support myself and my 5 children. I had nowhere to turn and you provided sanctuary.”

Pamela fled an abusive relationship when she was 7 months pregnant with her 5th child. She discovered Interval House's BESS (Building Economic Self-Sufficiency) program and her journey to freedom began. Together, we helped Pamela get into community housing, gain full custody of her children, finalize her permanent residency in Canada and rebuild her career.

During the BESS workshop, Pamela

found that her strengths were customer service and financial services. Interval House has a partnership with a BMO Bank of Montreal branch where our BESS graduates can apply for internships and jobs. Pamela interviewed for an internship, but the manager decided to hire her as a Customer Service Representative.

Today, Pamela has bought her own home, climbed the ranks and now manages the Interval House staff retirement plan. And, a true career woman, she struggles to find work/life balance, wishing she could spend more time with her children and find more time for the gym.

“I know I can knock on their door at any point in time and Interval House will be there for me. And the skills I learned here I still use every single day.”



AMANDA'S STORY

FORMER CHILD RESIDENT

"I had no clue why we were living there or why we left home. But I remember knowing we were safe."

Amanda was a child who came to Interval House with her mother and brother on a cold, dark night in 1982. At Interval House, Amanda's mother began to build a new life for her and her kids. She finished college and now works in a hospital. Amanda is an author and has come back to Interval House to help women and children with a dramatic arts program based on her children's book, *Gifts*.

"Interval House simply does it right. Oftentimes, people cross their fingers and hope their donations will be used properly. But you don't have to worry about that with Interval House. I'm living proof! And there are scores of former Interval House kids just like me over the decades who have been helped as well. You have helped us to break one devastating cycle and replace it with a new one – of love, hope and renewed self-esteem."



VINCE'S STORY

COMMUNITY CHAMPION

“We like what Interval House does. A big part of what they do involves helping women move to independence.”

Vince Brescia is the President and CEO of The Federation of Rental Housing Providers of Ontario and a proud Interval House supporter. As one of our corporate partners, they share our vision for a new affordable housing model in Toronto where women will have more say in the apartments they call home. With combined financial, employment and housing supports, women with low incomes can choose to rent in the private market – close to friends, school or work – while getting back on her feet.

This innovative approach to housing means that women and children take Interval House with them into the neighbourhood and home of their choice.


“We’ve always been supporters of a housing allowance. Rather than the funds going to the landlord, the funds go to the tenant and they choose where they want to live.”



STATEMENT OF OPERATIONS


